New center empowers Michigan communities to tackle renewable energy projects

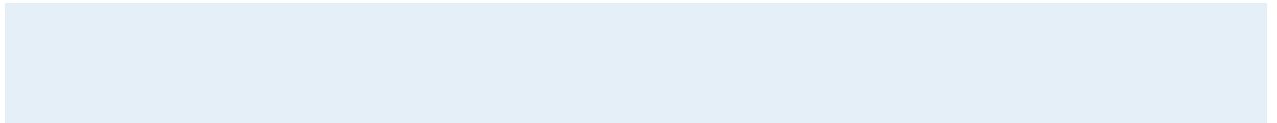
The Graham Sustainability Institute has launched the [Center for EmPowering Communities](#) to foster decarbonization solutions that advance community goals and priorities. The center helps Michigan communities with the planning and zoning processes related to renewable energy projects, such as wind and solar installations. In addition, the center spurs collaborative research that integrates social science with technology design, community engagement, and policymaking.

The center will be led by Sarah Mills, PhD, a noted expert in farmland preservation, rural prosperity, and planning and zoning for renewable energy. The establishment of the center is a natural progression of Mills's prior energy-focused work at the Graham Sustainability Institute, which has garnered increasing interest from researchers, practitioners, and stakeholders.

"The Center for EmPowering Communities is designed to respond to stakeholder needs and catalyze research

and education around renewable energy in a way that is community-centered,” said Mills, who is also an associate professor of practice in U-M’s Urban and Regional Planning Program.

“At the heart of this endeavor is a network of partnerships forged with stakeholders from the public, private, and non-governmental sectors. By collaborating deeply with these diverse entities, we can identify and elevate issues and opportunities at the intersection of land use, decarbonization, and economic development. Our goal is to bridge the gap between theory and real-world implementation, shaping policies and strategies that align with local objectives.”

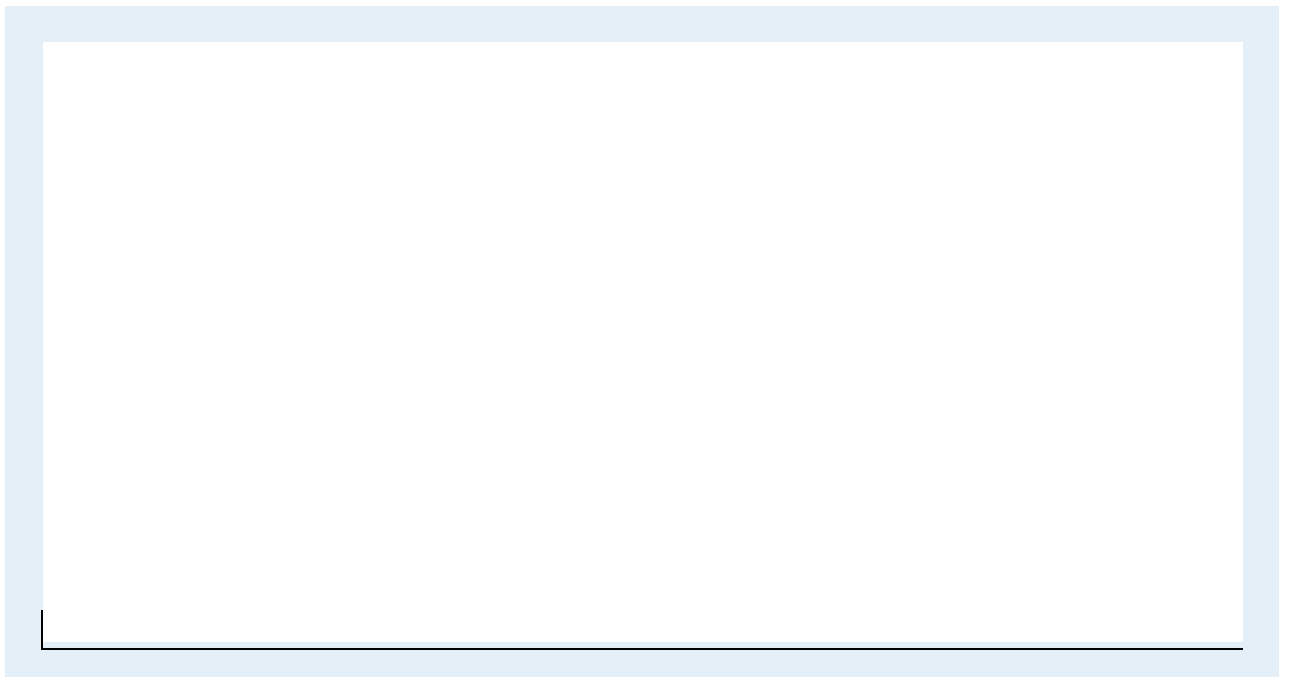

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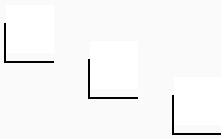

I attended a webinar a couple weeks ago for the DOE [Energy Future Grants](#) program, and was reviewing the FOA to see if it could be leveraged to fund some FM energy projects. I talked with Jason and, given the stipulation for "multijurisdictional partnerships" between 3-4 local govt partners, we agreed that it wouldn't make sense for Facilities to be a lead applicant. It does, however, align with a lot of the goals/actions outlined in Resilient Washtenaw, so I wanted to make sure you're aware of it, because I think the County as a whole could be a lead applicant.
