IV. General Administration

A. County Health Officer’s COVID-19 Update (Jimena Loveluck, WCHD)

Jimena Loveluck presented slides on COVID 19 and the County’s status of vaccination distribution, positivity rates, case trends, upcoming changes to statewide broad epidemic orders, and more. Please see slides [here in the updated June 2nd meeting packet](#) (slides start on page 8).

Following her presentation, Loveluck responded to a variety of questions from Committee members and staff.

B. Update on 2021 CDBG Allocation; Updates to FY 2021-22 Annual Action Plan (Tara Cohen, OCED)

Cohen explained that HUD contacted the County on May 14th to correct an error in its CDBG formula calculation, noting that the new, corrected allocation represents an increase of \$32,363 in CDBG funds. Cohen referenced the detailed table included in the meeting packet’s agenda summary showing the specific increase in CDBG funding by activity. There were no questions or discussion among members. Cohen asked for a member to move to approve the updated 2021 Action Plan using the suggested motion language in their packet, noting that the Board of Commissioners is scheduled to approve the Plan at their meeting tonight.

C. Approval of updated FY2021-22 Annual Action Plan (ACTION) (Tara Cohen, OCED)

Motion: The Urban County Executive Committee approves the final 2021 Annual Action Plan -- reflecting a \$32,363 increase in CDBG funding that resulted from HUD’s recent correction of its formula calculations – and recommends that the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners follow suit in adopting the Plan at their meeting on June 2, 2021.

D. COVID-related Programs and Resources

1) COVID Emergency Rental Assistance (CERA) Program (Teresa Gillotti, OCED)

Sharde Crutchfield explained that Gillotti was unable to make today's meeting to provide this update, however OCED Human Services Manager Morghan Boydston will attend the July meeting to share updates related to the CERA Program.

E. General Updates

1) HUD Proposed Rule re: Equal Access to HUD programs/facilities

Cohen shared that recently HUD Secretary Marcia Fudge announced that HUD is withdrawing the Trump administration's proposed rule that would have significantly weakened the 2016 Community Planning & Development (CPD) Equal Access Rule. She explained that the Equal Access Rule in intended to ensure equal access – regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity - to all of HUD's CPD programs, shelters, other buildings/facilities, benefits, services, and accommodations. Cohen then referenced the links in the packet agenda summary to Secretary Fudge's press release as well as to resources to assist providers implement the Equal Access Rule.

2) Minor updates to Summary of Planned Activities Tables (2019)

Cohen referenced the 2019 Summary of Planned Activities Tables in the meeting packet, which shows minor updates in pink font to reflect reprogramming of various project funds within 3 of the local units - Pittsfield Township, Superior Township, and Ypsilanti Township. She explained that these updates are informational only (i.e. no action required) and intended for transparency about where/how CDBG funds are being spent.

3) Community Announcements/updates (All)

- o Mayor Richardson announced that Ypsilanti City Council voted last night to allow large events only when the City's weekly COVID rates are averaging 400 or below. Lamar Weir of Congresswoman Dingell's office asked whether this meant that Pride events are still up in the air. Richardson confirmed that this is correct.
- o Shink asked Weir how Congresswoman Dingell is doing and asked that he please pass along her well wishes and thanks. Weir stated that she is doing well, following doctor's orders and getting as much rest as possible.

MDHHS provides State Emergency Relief to low-income residents who need home repairs because of flooding

LANSING, Mich. – Low-income residents affected by recent flooding in Michigan may be eligible for emergency relief assistance through the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS).

The State Emergency Relief program provides immediate help to families and individuals facing conditions of extreme hardship or [for emergencies that threaten health and safety](#). It is available to eligible residents that need help with home repairs necessary to correct unsafe conditions and restore essential services.

Applicants must be the owner or purchaser of the home and meet other eligibility requirements – including income limits – to qualify.

“Flooding can be devastating – especially to households that lack the resources to fix unsafe conditions that can affect their families,” said Lewis Roubal, MDHHS chief deputy director for opportunity. “MDHHS is committed to assisting these families in paying for home repairs that are necessary due to flooding or other reasons.”

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has issued a state of emergency in Wayne County in response to flooding. More flooding is possible in Michigan, with flood warnings in Kent and Clinton counties in place until Thursday.

The lifetime maximum amount of funds available for non-energy related home repairs is \$1,500 per household. State Emergency Relief Program assistance is available for repairs not covered by homeowner’s insurance for the basic house structure, hot water heater, septic/waste disposal system, doors/windows, extermination services, electrical, plumbing, roofs and wells.

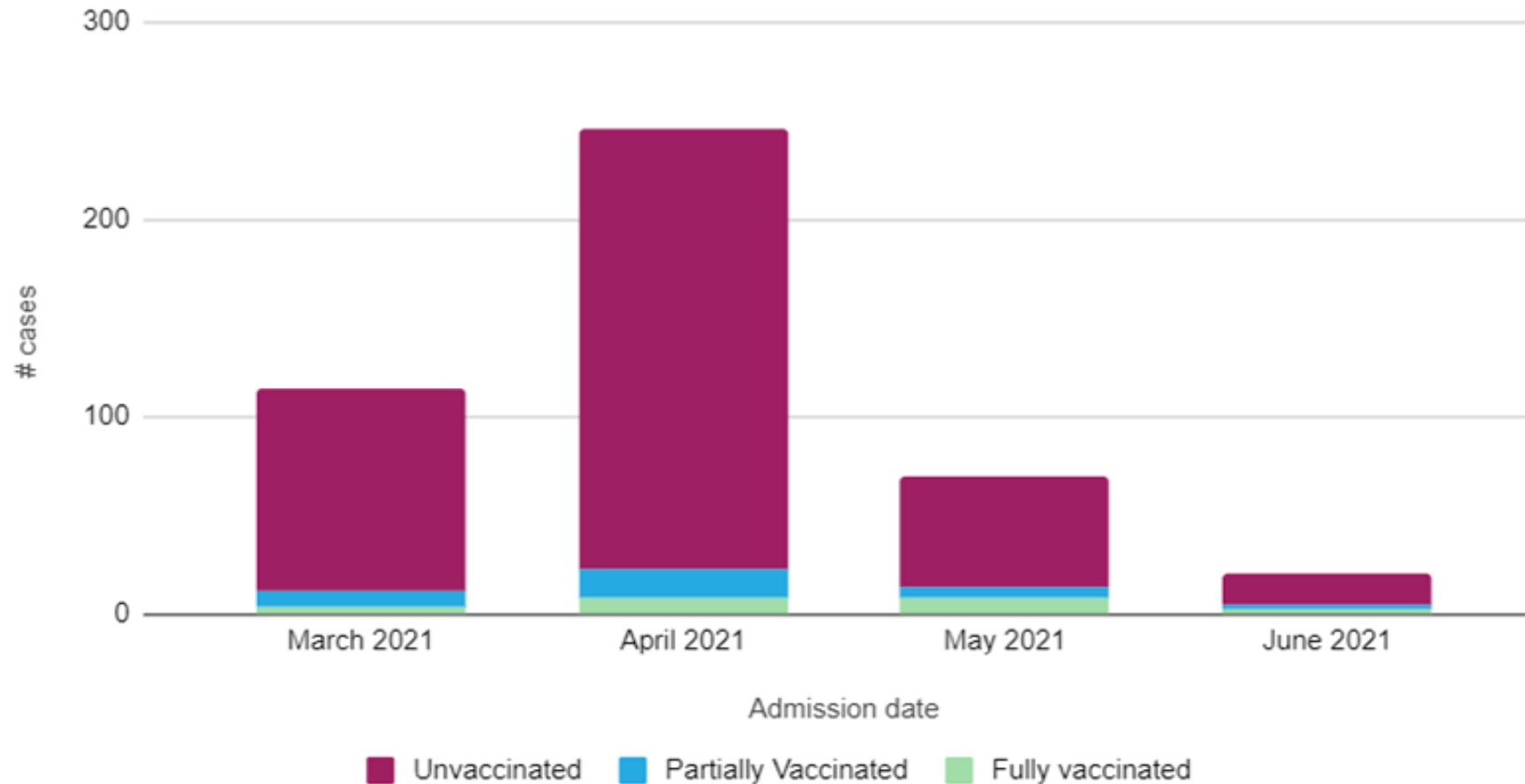

Washtenaw County hospitalized confirmed and probable COVID-19 cases (N=451)

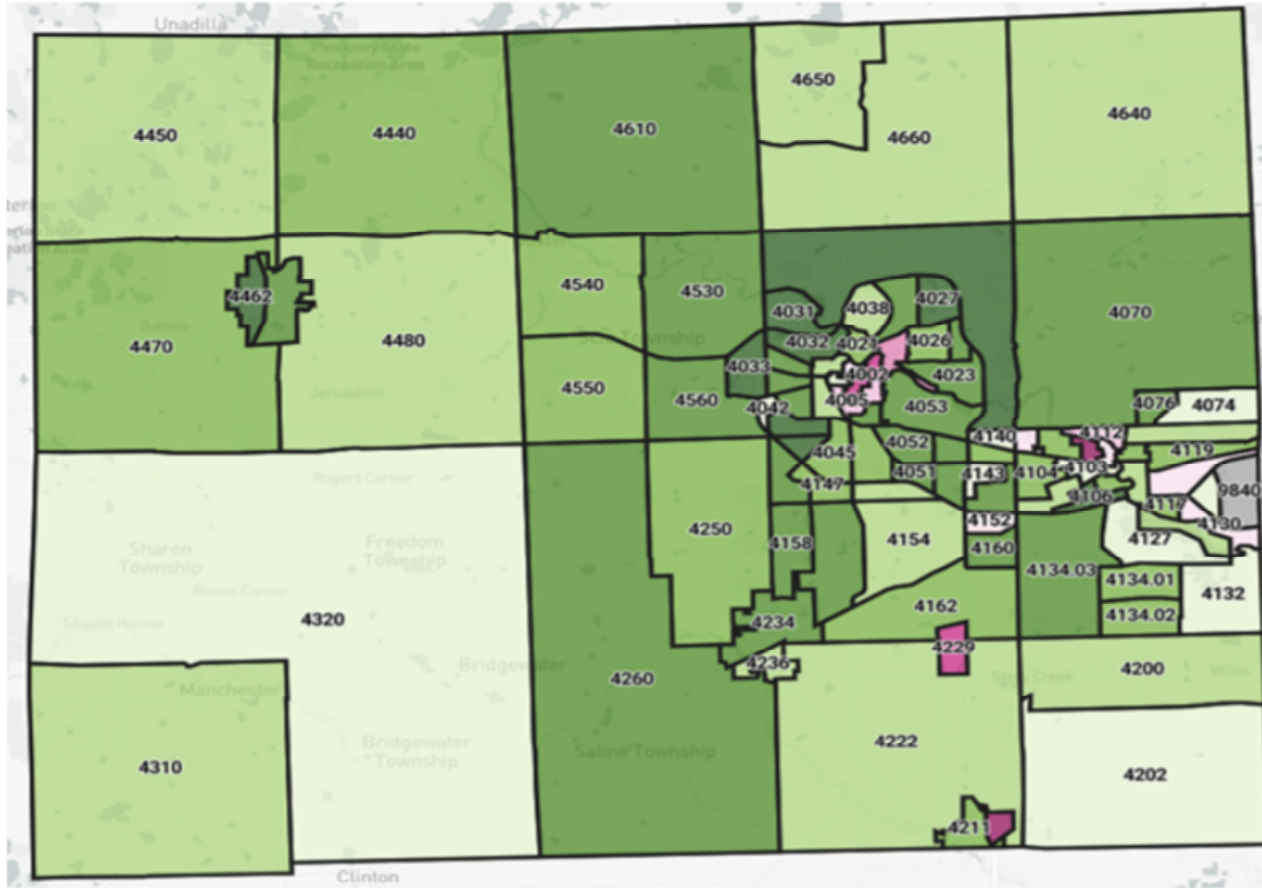

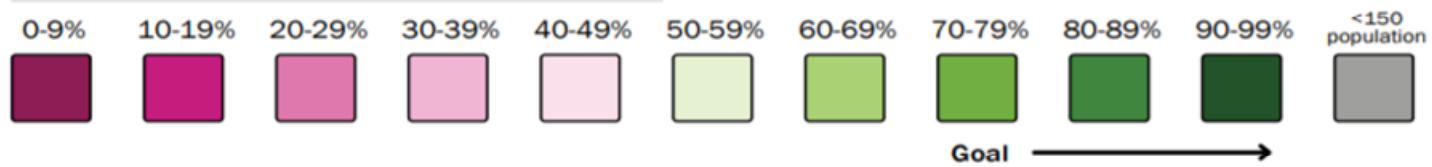

Weatherization Assistance Program

What we do: We work to make low-income homes more comfortable, energy efficient, and healthy.

New in 2021 - Weatherization of multifamily properties*

*2-4 unit buildings must have 50% of the units qualify

*5+ units 66% or more of the units must qualify for weatherization



Common Improvements:

- Air Sealing throughout the home
- Attic Insulation
- Wall Insulation
- Foundation Insulation (sill box and crawlspace walls)
- Refrigerator Replacement (for homeowner only)
- Furnace Replacement
- Ventilation (bath fan or range hood)

Wrap around services: We assess the condition of the home and look for ways to prevent deterioration and preservation of the building and components.

- Roof replacements*
- Necessary sewer and plumbing repairs*
- Asbestos remediation*

Common Questions:

How Does the Program Work?

- If an applicant is found eligible, their project is assigned to an OCED-approved licensed contractor. OCED staff will monitor all work and will ensure that it is done correctly and within program guidelines.

What Does It Cost?

- Weatherization and Health and Safety Projects* are completely free.
- When housing rehabilitation is needed, smaller home repairs are typically free for the applicant.
- Larger projects (roof replacement) will result in a 0% interest loan where a lien will be placed on the home. (With this lien, no payments are required until the time of sale or change in ownership.)

*H&S Projects are funded through DTE and subject to funding approval

Weatherization Program

Eligibility is based on household income. Households receiving Supplementary Security Income (SSI) are automatically eligible.

1 - \$25,760	5 - \$62,080
2 - \$34,840	6 - \$71,160
3 - \$43,920	7 - \$80,240
4 - \$53,000	8 - \$89,320

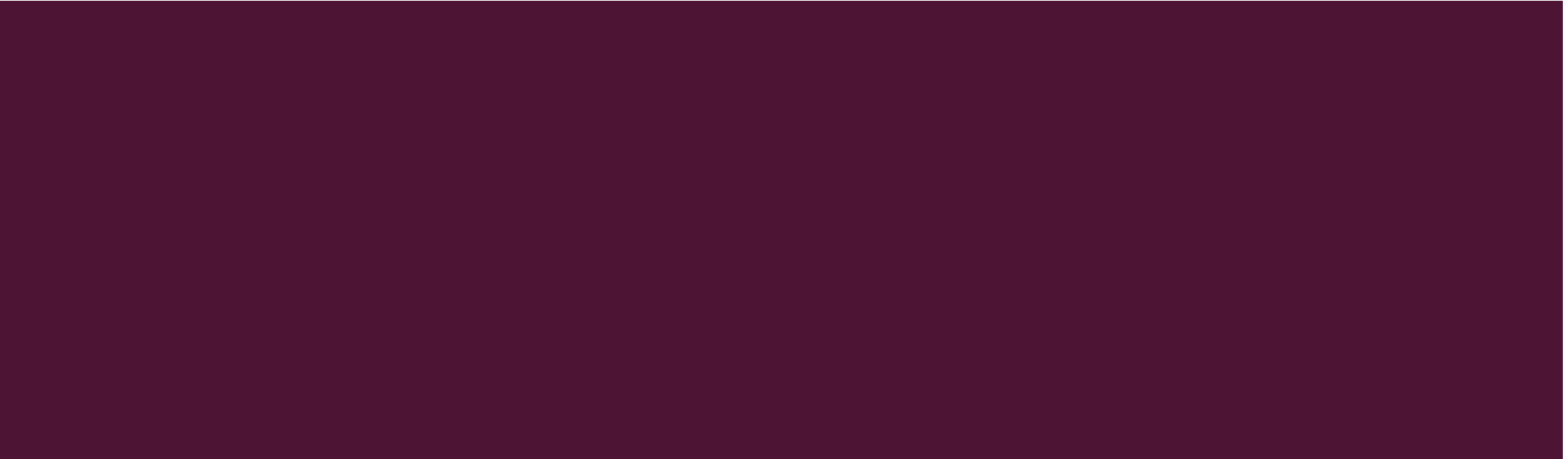

Eligibility

- Tenant household income must be no more than 80% of Area Median, and
 - One or more individual in the household currently or at some point after March 13, 2020,
 - qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in household income or incurred significant costs or
 - experienced other financial hardship due directly or indirectly to the corona virus outbreak, and
- The household:
 - is currently defined as Category I Homeless (Literally Homeless (I) Individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, meaning:
 - (i) Has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not meant for human habitation;
 - (ii) Is living in a publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state and local government programs); or
 - (iii) Is exiting an institution where (s)he has resided for 90 days or less and who resided in an emergency shelter or place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution or o is doubled up with another household or o can demonstrate a risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability which may include a:
- Past due utility notice or
- Past due rent notice (including a ledger or statement showing rent arrears or a Notice to Quit) or an eviction notice
- Households may not receive CERA assistance to cover rental arrearages that were part of the landlord forgiveness for MSHDA's Eviction Diversion Program or paid for with MSHDA's Eviction Diversion Program funding (or any agency's eviction prevention program).

Rental Assistance

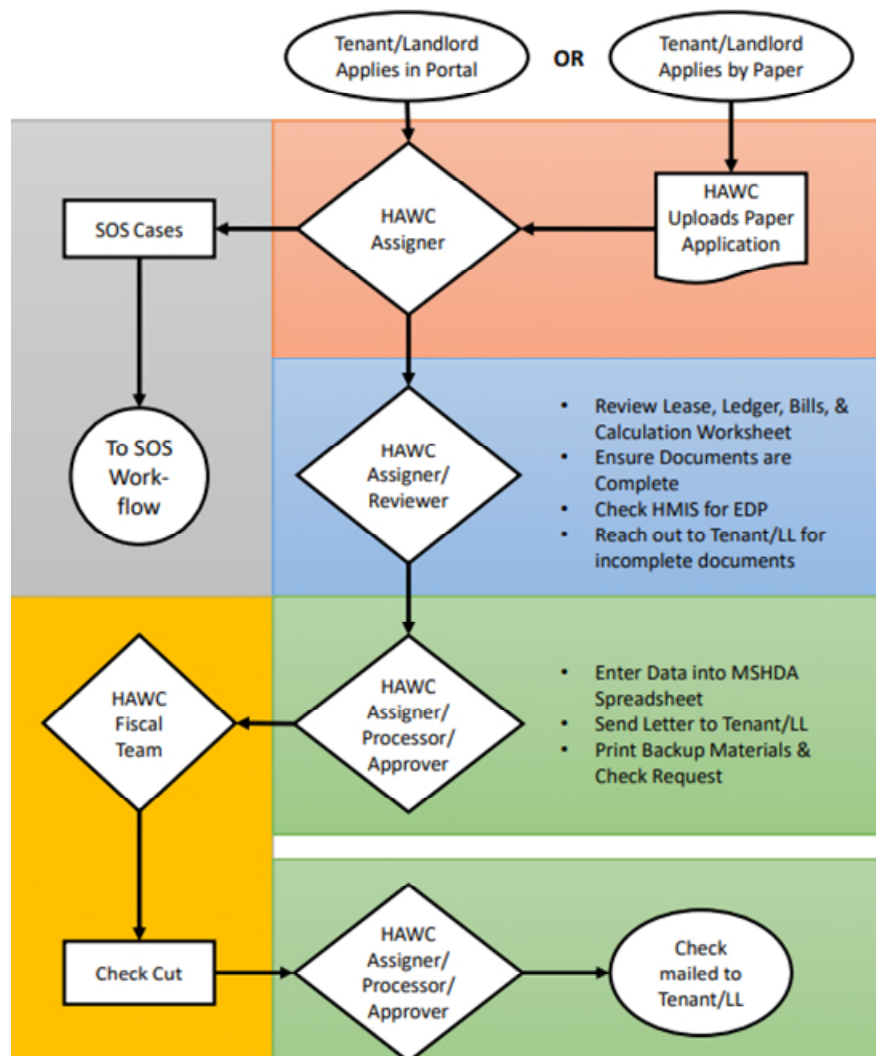
Tenant AMI	Total Full Months Rental Assistance (including up to 3 months future rent assistance)	Late Fees	Court Costs and Court
Up to and including 50% AMI	12 months	\$400 maximum	\$150 maximum
51-80% AMI	10 months	\$400 maximum	\$150 maximum

- **An additional three months of rental assistance may be provided if necessary, for housing stability, but is subject to availability of funds.**
- **Rental assistance is capped at 15 months total for households up to and including 50% AMI.**
- **Rental assistance is capped at 13 months total for households 51-80% AMI.**
- **Rental assistance for households moving from homeless/doubled situations is capped at 3 months of initial assistance and 3 months of additional assistance.**

Rental Assistance Examples

Up to and including 50% AMI:

- Example #1
 - 9 months of arrears on or after March 13, 2020
 - Tenant eligible for 9 months of arrears and 3 months future rent (12 months total)
 - Tenant may be eligible for one additional assistance block of three months future rent based on availability of funding and redetermination of eligibility through recertification process

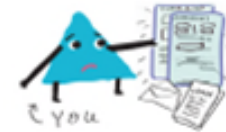

SUCCESS AND BARRIERS

Successes:

- Ongoing partnership with Washtenaw County eviction courts
- Preventing judgements for evictions through the moratorium, maintaining positive rental histories for tenants
- Worked with manpower to increase staffing for the program
- Buenos Vecinos is providing supports to Spanish speakers in community
- Created a community Navigation guide

Barriers:

- Without judgements, it's hard to maintain follow through with tenants to complete application process
- Online portal can be complicated for some to use
- A high learning curve for temporary staff
- Constant changes in program
