A. Resilient Washtenaw Overview & Discussion: Local Units' Role in Climate Action Planning (Andrew DeLeeuw, County Administration)

DeLeeuw gave a powerpoint presentation on the County's Resilient Washtenaw process for climate action planning – slides are found in the updated meeting packet starting on page 10. After the presentation, there was an opportunity for Q & A. There was a brief discussion about public transportation and alternative fuel vehicles.

B. Affordable Housing RFP #8244 Award recommendations (Tara Cohen, OCED)

Cohen gave an overview of the 4 proposed projects received from Avalon Housing, followed by OCED's funding recommendations for each. The 4 projects are expected to result in 12 rehabbed affordable units in various locations in Ann Arbor (411 N. Ashley, 517 W. Summit, 1305-1313 Pontiac Trail), and 17 reconstructed rental units in Ypsilanti (206/210 N. Washington). Project details start on page 5 of the [meeting packet](#). Funding awards for RFP #8244 proposals will be formally approved as part of the overall 2022 Action Plan when the UCEC moves to approve in May.

Washtenaw County's Health Officer, Jimena Loveluck, will provide a brief update on the state of COVID-19 and vaccination rollout in Washtenaw County.

Summary of 2022-23 Draft Action Plan (Tara Cohen, OCED)

HUD has yet to release information to Washtenaw County regarding our FY2022-23 entitlement allocations. For this reason, the [Draft 2022 Action Plan](#) and [Draft Summary of Planned Activities Table](#) posted online reflect estimated allocations (based on FY2021 allocations).

CDBG Allocation/Summary Table of Planned Activities – 2022 Annual Action Plan

A simplified version of the Draft Action Plan's Summary of Planned Activities is shown on the following page. The more comprehensive version is also included in your packet and can be found on our website [here](#) under **Urban County Plans & Reports**. Included are the following: Single Family Rehab/Home Improvement Programs makes up approximately 19% of CDBG funding (\$432,350); this budgeted amount represents the standard baseline of around 15% (\$350,000) plus all project funds forfeited by the member jurisdictions without a 2022 project application (\$82,350). Single Family Rehab Service Delivery is 6%. Per HUD CDBG regulations, Human Services funding is capped at 15%, and CDBG Administration is capped at 20%. Local projects proposed by Local Units of Government (LUGs) are included based on estimated allocations for LUGs and according to the 2022 CDBG project applications submitted by members/designees and reviewed by OCED staff for eligibility.

HOME Allocation – 2022 Annual Action Plan

An overview of the County's **Affordable Housing Request for Proposals (RFP #8244)** process, proposals, and OCED's funding recommendations were presented at the last UCEC meeting on March 2, 2022 and can be found in the March meeting packet [here](#). Proposal scoring and award recommendations are based on estimates; actual awards will need to be adjusted once the County receives our FY2022 allocations from HUD. Funding award recommendations from the March agenda packet are included below for everyone's convenience. It should be noted that the re-programmed \$236,500 from 2017 and 2021 Action Plans do not appear in the 2022 Action Plan or Summary of Planned Activities, because HUD only

wants to see the allocations of the 2022 funds. The reallocation of older funds will be reflected through administrative updates to the 2017 and 2021 Action Plans, as these specific changes do not trigger substantial amendments.

ESG Allocation – 2022 Annual Action Plan

As reflected in the Summary of Planned Activities, program funding to be awarded to homeless service providers is being kept flat from 2021 at \$174,459, with only \$9,361 (5.1%) going to ESG administration. Please note that ESG funds are awarded through the Continuum of Care's (CoC) Funding Review Team in the summer following the Action Plan approval and submission. UCEC delegates the awarding of HUD ESG funds to the CoC.

Schedule of 2022-23 Action Plan Public Hearings & Comment Period (Tara Cohen, OCED)

The Annual Action Plan identifies the specific projects and programs that the County intends to implement with CDBG, HOME and ESG funding during the period July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023. Today's public hearing is the first of three (3) public hearings inviting participation and/or written comments on the Annual Action Plan from any person having an interest, or their duly appointed representative, in the Urban County's 20 participating jurisdictions.

Public Notice for the public hearings and 30-Day Comment Period for the FY2022-23 Draft Annual Action plan were published in the Thursday Classifieds of the Ann Arbor News and on Mlive.com on March 17th, posted on OCED's website and Facebook page on March 18th.

The 30-day comment period began Monday, March 28th and will conclude April 29th, to solicit input on the draft 2022 Action Plan. 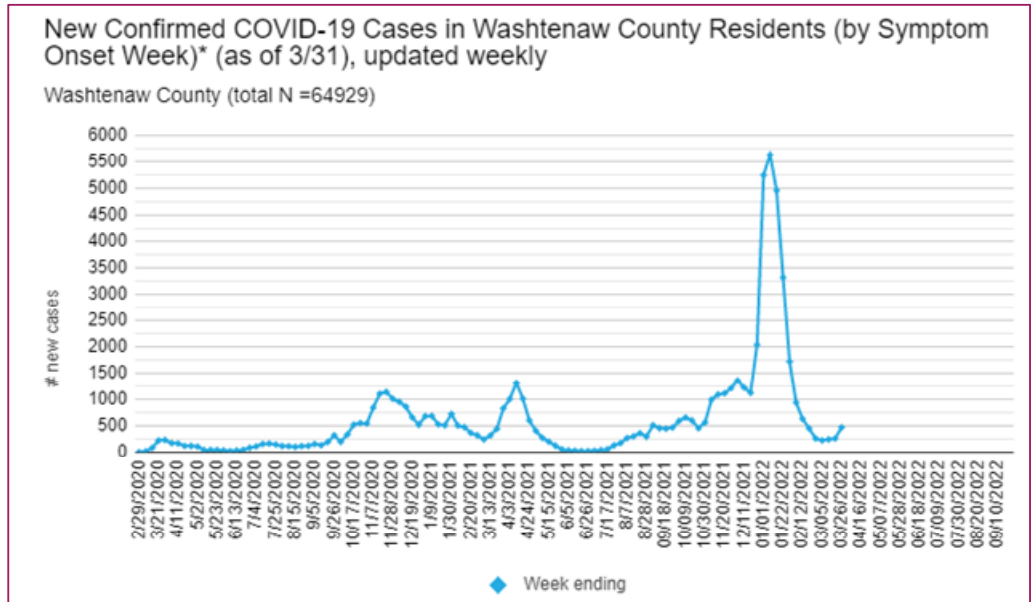

COVID-19 Current Situation

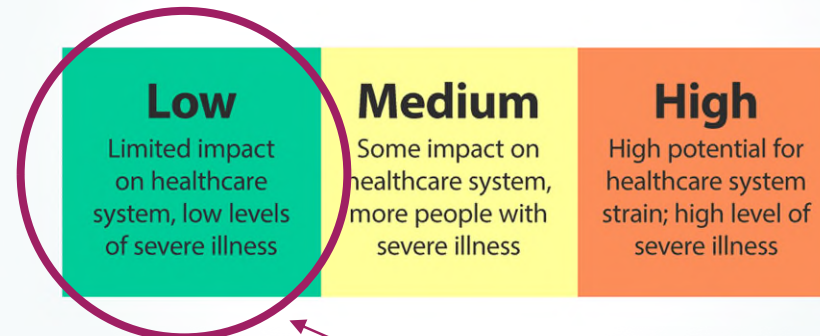
- Currently at “low” CDC Community Level
- Vaccination protects against severe illness & death
- No longer broad recommendation to mask in indoor public locations
 - People can wear a mask based on preference or increased risk for themselves or others
 - People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure should wear a mask
 - If wearing a mask, a multilayer, surgical, KN95, or N95 mask is recommended rather than a cloth mask

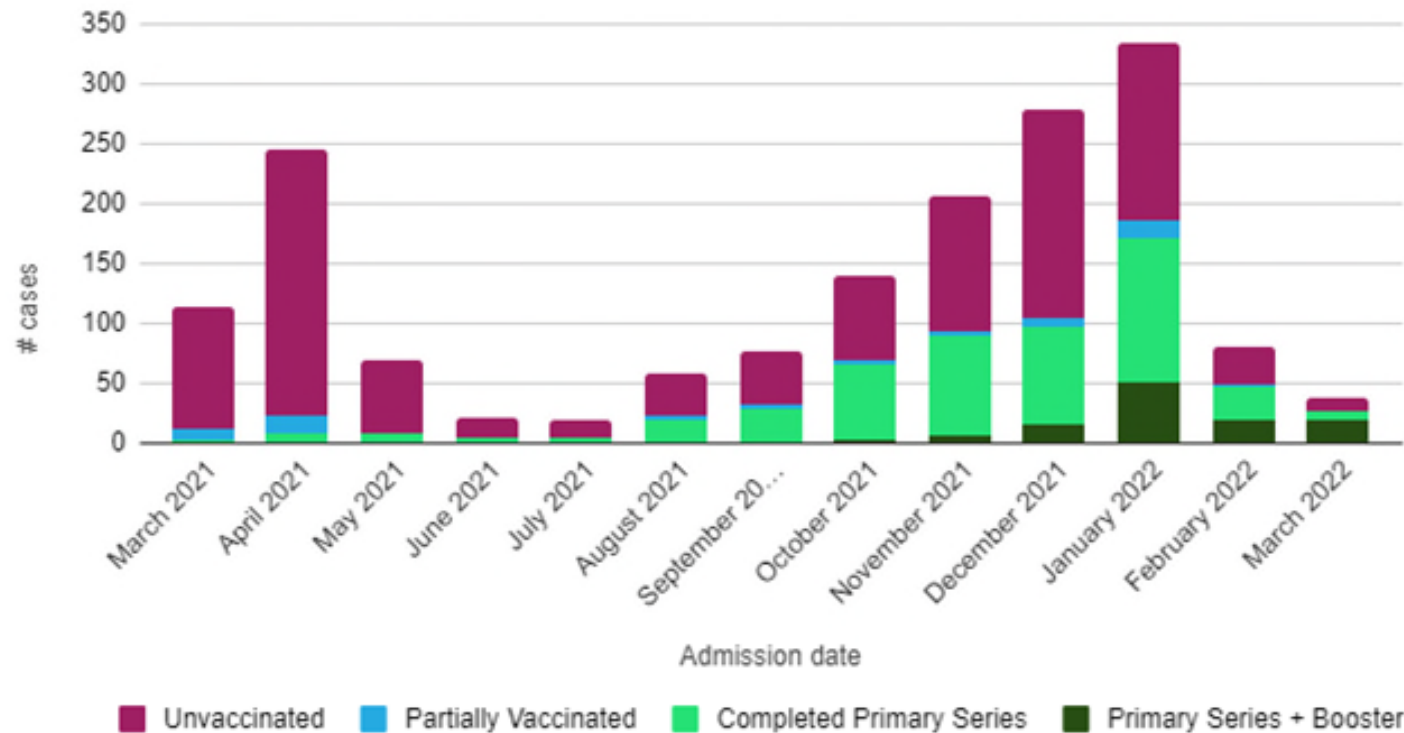

Second COVID-19 booster doses are now available!

If you are **50+ years**, you may choose to receive a second booster dose once **4 months** have passed since your last booster.*

If you are 12+ years and are moderately to severely **immunocompromised**, you may choose to receive a second booster dose once **4 months** have passed since your last booster.*

*Talk to your health care provider to decide which booster vaccine is right for you.

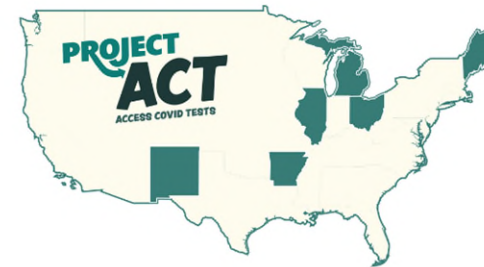

Understanding Personal and Household Risk

Protect yourself from COVID-19 by understanding levels of risk, practicing good hygiene and hand washing, staying home when sick, and staying up to date with vaccinations. Masking is a personal and local community choice. Know your risk; know that others may have a risk different from yours. Respect the choice.



Masking is a proven way to reduce your risk of COVID-19.

When making decisions about risk, consider the setting, your vaccination status and current level of community transmission in addition to the personal and family risk factors* noted below.

Up to Date on vaccine includes any booster doses as defined by the CDC. Additionally, individuals who have tested positive for COVID-19 in the past 90 days would fall into similar risk categories as those who are up to date on vaccination.

***Risk factors** include older adults (60+) and those who have serious chronic medical conditions like heart disease, diabetes or lung disease (at any age), and those who live in high-risk congregate settings (like nursing homes, corrections facilities and shelters). If you live with others who have risk factors, consider their health in addition to your personal health.

If test is positive:
follow isolation
