- Wendy Carty-Saxon of Avalon Housing stated that Hilltop View in the City of Dexter now has certificates of occupancy for all 5 buildings, noting it is exciting to see tenants starting to move in. She said that 15 of the 24 units are for people coming out of homelessness, as well as a number

of units dedicated to veterans. She extended an invitation to everyone for the Hilltop View open house on June 7th. She also thanked the Committee for the 2022 HOME awards.

b. Overview of 2022 HUD Allocations (Tara Cohen, OCED)

Cohen noted that HUD released information to Washtenaw County regarding the FY2022-23 entitlement allocations on May 18, 2022. Compared to previous year, she pointed out that the Urban County is receiving a slight decrease in CDBG funds, a slight increase in ESG funds, and a significant increase in HOME funds. A table was provided with more detail.

- Chairperson Shink made note of the concerns recently voiced by safety net service providers after New Human Services Partnership grants were announced; she stated that the Board of Commissioners would be approving some additional transitional funding for the previous Coordinated Funding grantees who did not receive safety net awards through NHSP.
- Joe Meyers mentioned that the city of Ypsilanti is working on an affordable housing project on Clark Road – the first big construction of new affordable (or attainable) housing since 2006. He said there will be 46 units, with half being senior housing and the other half geared toward families. All units will be below market rate. Including the N. Park project, Ypsilanti will be adding 350 new units, all north of Michigan Avenue, over the next few years.

- Chris Brown of Habitat for Humanity congratulated City of Ypsilanti on their affordable housing projects and tentatively offered Habitat as a future partner to assist with finding buyers for some of the new units.

County Health Officer's COVID-19 Update (Jimena Loveluck, WC Health Department)

Washtenaw County's Health Officer, Jimena Loveluck, will provide a brief update on the state of COVID-19 and vaccination rollout in Washtenaw County.

Update on 2022 HUD Allocations (Tara Cohen, OCED)

As noted at our last meeting in June, HUD released information to Washtenaw County regarding the FY2022-23 entitlement allocations on May 18, 2022. We are receiving a slight decrease in CDBG funds, a slight increase in ESG funds, and a significant increase in HOME funds. Our combined total for the 3 grant programs has increased approximately 2.8% from our 2021 funding levels.

OCED submitted the 2022 Action Plan to HUD on June 22nd. At this time, we are still awaiting HUD's approval of said Plan. We were also notified by HUD that there will be a delay between Action Plan approval and receipt of the Urban County's 2022 grant agreements due to delays at HUD headquarters. Once we do receive the HUD grant agreements, each jurisdiction will be receiving a formal 2022 CDBG allocation letter for your records – for those with approved CDBG projects, the letter will reference the project.

Assessment of Fair Housing Plan: Request for Subcommittee Members (Tara Cohen, OCED)

In 2017, in compliance with HUD's [Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing](#) (AFFH) mandate, OCED developed a comprehensive Assessment of Fair Housing Plan (AFH Plan) on behalf of the Urban County, and in partnership with the Ann Arbor Housing Commission. This Plan laid out goals for a 5-year period and informed the Five-Year Consolidated Plan that runs through June 30, 2023. In 2017, we formed a small Steering Subcommittee to develop the goals for the AFH Plan. Three UCEC members participated on that subcommittee. The Trump administration did away with AFFH, and as of now, HUD only requires a "voluntary fair housing planning process." This fall,

OCED intends to make updates to the Urban County's 2017 AFH Plan, with a focus on key sections and elements of the Plan to provide a framework for the next 5-year planning period (FY 2023 – FY 2027). At this time, we are asking for volunteers from this Committee to serve on an ad hoc subcommittee that would meet approximately 3-5 times in August – October.

Green Standards for HUD-Assisted Affordable Housing Projects (Tara Cohen, OCED)

Currently, the annual Affordable Housing Request for Proposals requires developers to utilize one specific type of green building standard certification – [Enterprise Green Communities](#) – in order to score points on their proposal under this area of the rubric. While green building standards is just one of many components being scored on affordable housing proposals submitted to the County, OCED is interested in providing more flexibility to developers to select from more than one type of green certification; specifically we are considering the inclusion of National Green Building Standard Certification, and possibly LEED certification. This mirrors MSHDA's requirements. We will keep you apprised once we have proposed changes to the RFP requirements, and by November we plan to reflect such changes in the [Urban County's Housing Program Guidelines](#), at which time we would be recommending the UCEC's approval of those proposed changes.

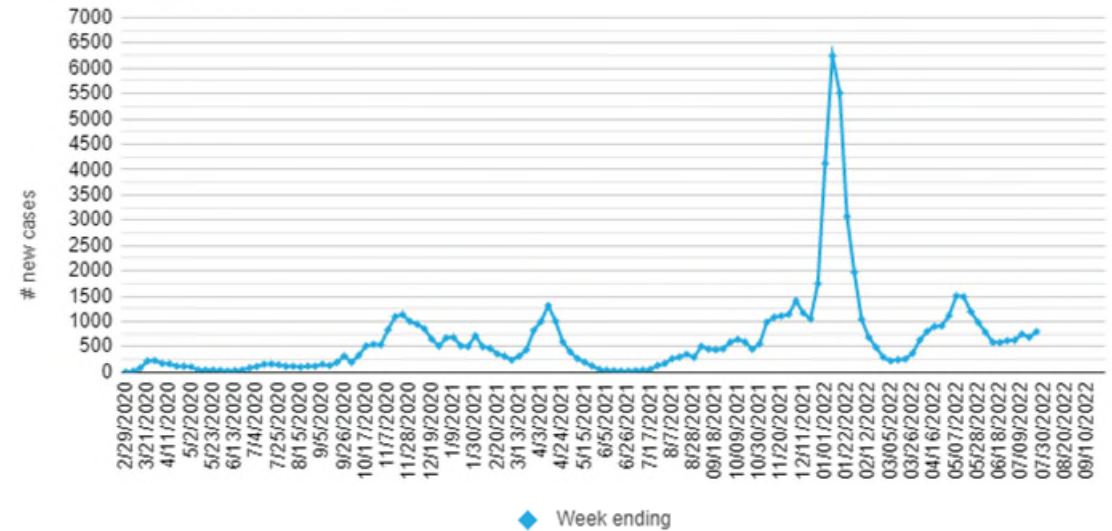


COVID-19 Current Situation

- Currently at high CDC Community Level
- Vaccination protects against severe illness & death
- Everyone is recommended to mask in indoor public locations
 - People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure should definitely wear a mask
 - A multilayer surgical, KN95, or N95 mask is recommended rather than a cloth mask

New Confirmed COVID-19 Cases in Washtenaw County Residents (by Symptom Onset Week)* (as of 7/28), updated weekly

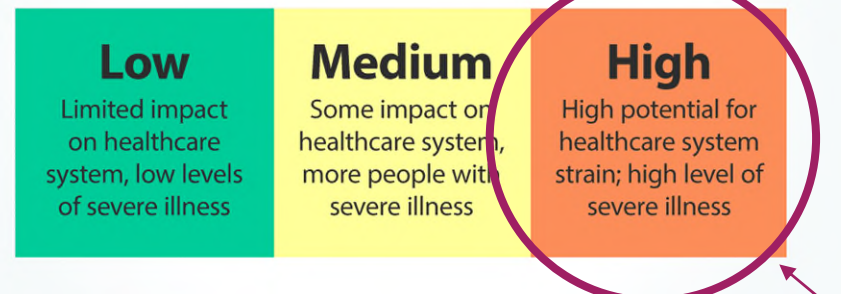

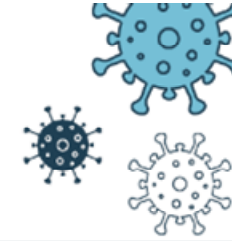

Make a plan for vaccination or learn if you are eligible for boosters.

- Ages 5 and older can get vaccinated.
- Ages 12 and older can get the booster.
- Ages 50 and older, or 12 and older and moderately to severely immunocompromised, can schedule a second booster.

Keep a supply of well-fitting masks.

Masks are helpful tools to reduce COVID-19 transmission, especially if:

- You are unwell or test positive for COVID-19.
- You have been exposed to someone with COVID-19.
- You are concerned about the risk of transmission in a particular setting. Respect that others may have a risk different than yours.

Keep a supply of over-the-counter COVID-19 tests.

Tests are useful for early detection of COVID-19, especially if:

- You have symptoms of or have been exposed to COVID-19.
- You are traveling or will be attending a large or unmasked gathering. Test before and after attending large events.



Over-the-counter tests are available at libraries and schools through MIbackpack, also through federal distribution programs. Learn more about COVID-19 testing at Michigan.gov/COVIDTest.

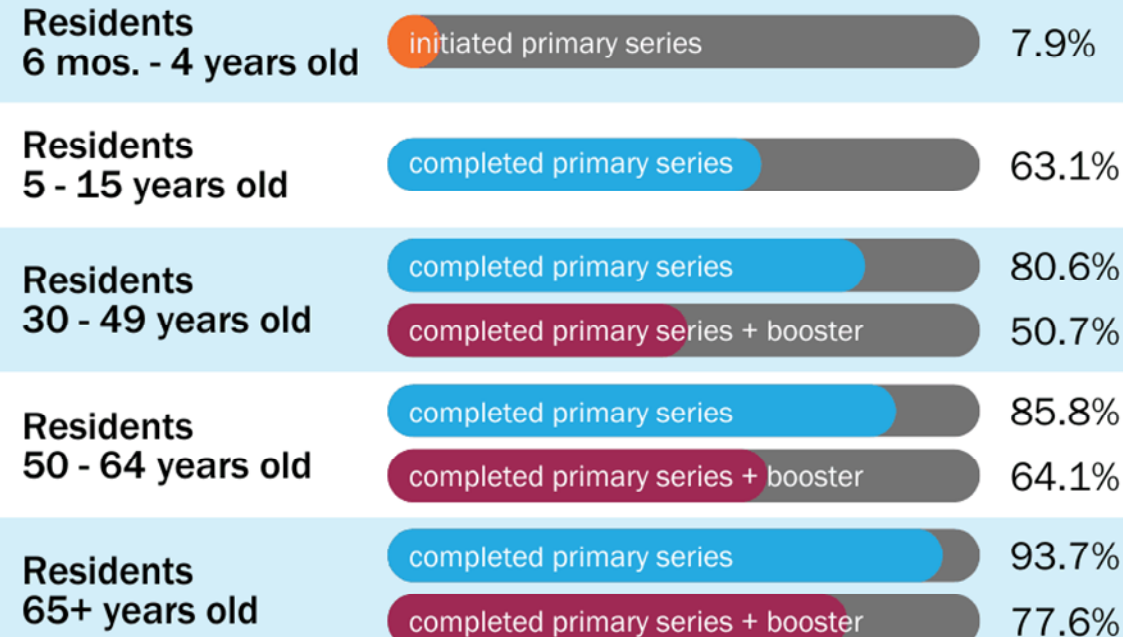

69.6% of all county residents have completed a primary series*

*This is likely an undercount: our college-age population is highly vaccinated but those doses aren't all reflected MCIR.

- Data obtained from the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR).
- A primary series of vaccine means 2 doses of Pfizer or Moderna or 1 dose of Johnson & Johnson.
- Ages 16-29 are not represented here because our large college-age population skews the vaccine data for this age group.



COVID-19 Vaccines

- Everyone 6 months old and older should get vaccinated!
- It is critically important that those who haven't yet gotten vaccinated do so as soon as possible.
- **Stay up-to-date on vaccines: boosters are very important!**
 - Everyone 12+ should get a booster and some people should get two boosters.

COVID-19 Testing

- Every home in the U.S. is allowed three orders of free at-home tests (16 tests total): <https://www.covidtests.gov/>
- Those living in Ypsilanti, Superior Township, and some Ann Arbor zip codes (48197, 48198, 48103, 48104, 48105, 48108, and 48109) can order free test kits through [Project ACT](#).
- For those with health insurance, most insurance plans will cover the cost of over-the-counter, at-home tests.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU TEST POSITIVE FOR COVID-19

(AKA isolation guidance)

1. Start isolating yourself right away.

- Stay home except to get medical care.
- Stay away from everyone else in your household (stay in a separate room, use separate bathroom if possible, etc.).
- Talk to your primary care provider or an urgent care provider right away to see if you qualify for treatment. This is especially important for those who are high risk.
- Tell your employer you have COVID-19.

2. Think of the people you were around 48 hours before you developed symptoms or tested positive (whichever came first).

- Tell them you tested positive so they can follow quarantine guidance. This is especially important for personal/household contacts* and immunocompromised or high-risk people.

*Personal/household contacts includes those who live with you, sleep over, carpool, or have direct exposure to your respiratory secretions (e.g., kissing, sharing drinks, changing diapers, etc.).

"Improving symptoms" means your symptoms have gotten noticeably better. Some symptoms (like fatigue & loss of smell) may last longer. For questions, contact your medical provider.

3. On Day 5, do you have no symptoms or are your symptoms improving?

- If yes, you can stop isolation on day 6**. Wear a well-fitting mask around others (including household members) through day 10. If you cannot wear a mask, continue isolating for the full 10 days.
- If no, you should not stop isolation. Continue isolating until symptoms improve or 10 days have gone by since you tested positive or first developed symptoms**.

**No one should leave isolation until they have been fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication. If symptoms are not resolving or are worsening, seek medical care. NOTE: If you develop symptoms after testing positive, your isolation period starts over. Day 0 is your first day of isolation.

When we say wear a mask, we mean a surgical, KN95, or N95 mask (not cloth!)

Additional recommendations from the Washtenaw County Health Department:

Taking these extra steps can further reduce your risk of spreading COVID-19 to others.

- Take a rapid antigen test on day 5 of isolation if possible.
 - If negative, end isolation on day 6 and wear a mask around others through day 10.
 - If positive, continue to isolate through day 10.
- If you end isolation on day 6, be more cautious through day 10. Limit being around others as much as you can.
- If you are often around vulnerable populations (e.g., immunocompromised or elderly people):
 - Consider continuing isolation for longer (a full 10 days).
 - If you decide to stop isolation before 10 days, take a rapid antigen test. If positive, consider isolating for the full 10 days.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU'RE EXPOSED TO SOMEONE WITH COVID-19

(AKA quarantine guidance/guidance for close contacts)

If the person you were exposed to is a personal or household contact:

Personal/household contacts includes those who live with you, sleep over, carpool, or have direct exposure to your respiratory secretions (e.g., kissing, sharing drinks, changing diapers, etc.).

- Monitor for symptoms for 10 days.
- Test at least one time if possible 3-7 days after exposure (if symptoms develop, definitely test).
- Wear a well-fitting mask for 10 days from the date of last exposure to protect others. If unable or unwilling to mask, quarantine at home for 10 days.
- Avoid unmasked activities or activities with higher risk of exposing vulnerable individuals for 10 days from the date of last exposure.*

If the person you were exposed to is not a personal or household contact:

(e.g., you were exposed in a community, social, or work setting)

- Monitor for symptoms for 10 days.
- Test if you develop symptoms.
- Consider wearing a well-fitting mask for 10 days from the date of last exposure to protect others. At a minimum, wear a mask in settings with higher risk of exposing vulnerable individuals.
- Avoid unmasked activities or activities with higher risk of exposing vulnerable individuals for 10 days from the date of last exposure.*

*Activities with higher risk of exposing vulnerable individuals may include activities where you cannot mask, interactions with those who are immunocompromised or other high-risk individuals, and social/recreational activities in congregate settings.

If you develop symptoms, avoid others and get tested (PCR or rapid antigen).

If positive, follow isolation guidance. If negative, stay home until symptoms resolve. If symptoms worsen or change, follow up with a medical provider and consider getting another test.

WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT COVID-19 TREATMENTS

(AKA COVID-19 therapies or COVID-19 therapeutics)

If you test positive for COVID-19, treatment options may be available to you.
Treatments can reduce the risk of becoming seriously ill or hospitalized.

HOW TO GET TREATMENT:

- If you test positive for COVID-19, talk to your primary care provider or an urgent care provider right away to see if you qualify for treatment.
- This is especially important for those who are high risk and/or are not up-to-date on their COVID-19 vaccines.
- Different treatments have different qualifications like age, weight, date since symptoms started, etc.
- You must have a prescription from a health care provider to get treatment.

Monkeypox: risk to the general public remains low

- We've had 3 cases in Washtenaw County
- Our team is:
 - Monitoring cases via contact tracing and case investigation
 - Working with local health care providers to provide testing, treatment, and vaccine support
 - Doing targeted outreach to reach priority populations with prevention education and vaccine information
 - Sharing awareness and prevention info with the general public

How does monkeypox spread?

Monkeypox spreads through close, personal, often skin-to-skin contact, including:

- Direct contact with monkeypox rashes, sores, or scabs
- During intimate sexual contact
- Contact with objects, fabrics (clothing, bedding, or towels), and surfaces that have been used by someone with monkeypox
- Through respiratory droplets or oral fluids from a person with monkeypox during prolonged face-to-face contact

Prevent Monkeypox:



Avoid contact with people recently diagnosed with the virus or those who may be infected.



Avoid contact with any materials that have been in contact with a sick animal or infected person.



Talk to close physical and sexual contacts about their general health, like recent rashes or sores.
