I. Welcome & Introductions – Roll Call

II. Public Comment

Commissioner Scott opened the meeting for public comment at 2:10 pm.

Wendy Carty-Saxon, Avalon Housing – *Hi, I'm Wendy Carty-Saxon with Avalon and we are partnering with the Ann Arbor Housing Commission [on 121 Catherine project, Dunbar Tower]. I just wanted to announce that we got our temporary certificates of occupancy last month for all 63 units. As of this morning, a third of them were already occupied. The rest should be leased up by the end of May. In the fall, we'll be doing a larger open house and there is more excitement there. I just wanted to mention this since the Urban County Executive Committee provided critical funding for this project, and let you know how excited we are to be at this point and having folks moving in – that's always the most enjoyable part.*

Kameron Donald, Breyko – *Hi my name is Kameron Donald; I'm the CEO of Breyko and president of Breyko Development Group. I'm coming before you guys today to tell you about the documentary we've been working on. We are in partnership with the Ann Arbor Housing Commission, and the name of documentary is "The Road Home". The purpose of this documentary is to address housing and homelessness in Washtenaw County as well as mental health. In preparation of this documentary and in completing research, we spoke to a lot of stakeholders, and it seems like you guys partner and work closely together within the county. We figured this documentary would be a good opportunity to bring people together, especially from our last documentary, "A Letter to the Westside" where we saw here was an appetite for people throughout the county to tell their story. There will be two showings of this documentary with the first being April 23rd and the second being May 7th. We plan on having additional screenings throughout the various cities in Washtenaw County. We do intend to have a panel for each screening. I will share the press kit so that you all can share it throughout your individual communities. We hope that this documentary can be used as tool as well as provide good information of what's going in Washtenaw County related to housing and homelessness.*

V. General Administration

A. Washtenaw County OCED 2025 Opportunity Index (Toni Kayumi, OCED)

OCED Director Toni Kayumi announced the launching of the new 2025 Opportunity Index and shared some brief background on its purpose. The 2025 Opportunity Index builds off previous iterations and now uses up-to-date data to measure Washtenaw County census tracts' access to opportunity. Director Kayumi noted based on feedback received from key stakeholders, a primary goal for the new Opportunity Index is to ensure it will be more user-friendly. Previous iterations utilized a GIS interface, which some nonprofits expressed was not the most useful tool when completing grant writing. To address concerns, OCED worked with Poverty Solutions to create a more user-friendly system within Tableau. Director Kayumi hopes communities find the updated Opportunity Index more helpful and easier to navigate. The updated version covers the following categories: Health, Job Access, Education, Training, Economic Well-being, and Community Engagement.

Comments/Questions:

(Q) Bullerman – This is my first meeting, so I do not have a lot of contexts on this item. How would a community get the best uses out of this system?

(A) Kayumi – So when we in the county are preparing resolutions for the Board of Commissioners, for example, we use this index to share potential impact related to opportunity with the resolutions that are being presented on. Your local government can also

use the index in the same way. Nonprofits typically use it in relation to grant writing, which your local government can also use as tool. Overall, the index will be good for gaining information on your local community, such as transportation access, educational success rate, or job access – there are a lot of ways to use this platform based on what your level of interest is.

(Q) Swanson – Because I see there is comparable data of the index done previously to the one done now, are there improvements? More so in the perspective of where we were, where we are now, and maybe something that we tried that did or didn't work?

(A) Kayumi – That is something that we asked Poverty Solutions to do for us, but they were unable to include that in this iteration. It was requested - hopefully in the next iteration that can be incorporated in the contract RFP so that [comparative] information can be available moving forward.

(Comment) Swanson – I do find this concerning for us and even for the community – I'm very familiar with the older iteration, and which areas we would have liked to see the shifts for to better navigate where need and opportunity is needed. So, we'll potentially have to wait longer for the comparison data till the next RFP to be implemented? Because right now for the areas that I'm referring to, they now look more concentrated, and I'm not sure if the old data is still available to do a comparison ourselves.

(A) Kayumi – We do have the former data points available from the old Opportunity Index that is in downloadable spreadsheets that can be shared if you're interested in doing some comparison. If there is additional feedback that is different, we will also incorporate those comments in the next RFP.

(A) Cohen – This is a good question and point, we did learn as well when completing this iteration, that some of the data points were not comparable in the time frames that they were set up to cover. So that was problematic as well, with the older iteration, not to minimize the data being presented then, but with this new iteration it is better suited for the time frames to line up. Toni, correct me if I'm wrong, but moving forward this will be an available option because data will be aligned with census data reports produced.

(A) Kayumi – The original resolution called for an update every three years, if I recall correctly. The census tract data and the other data sources that Poverty Solutions used in creating the information is not updated as frequently. And so, Commissioner Hodge, I believe, championed the first resolution to rectify the time difference, so that the Index is updated at the same time as the reports being produced where data is being pulled for the index.

B. Affordable Housing RFP #8861 Award recommendations (Karen Newman, OCED)

Newman gave an in-depth overview of the 2 proposed projects from Avalon Housing, followed by OCED's funding recommendations for each project. Newman noted there was an additional application submitted from a different organization, however the organization did not submit all the required application documents and was therefore disqualified for this funding round.

Based on estimated funding, at this time OCED staff recommends fully funding both of Avalon's projects along with the CHDO operating funds at 5% of the total HOME allocation outlined on pages 7-9 of the March meeting packet.

C. 2026 CDBG Project Applications (Jasmyne Townsend, OCED)

Townsend provided a brief update, and thanked communities included in Project Cycle 2026 for submitting their CDBG Project Applications by the due date of February 27th. As a reminder, Townsend explained this will be the first fiscal year implementing the new funding model outlined in the new

UCEC Policy and Procedures, adopted at the December UCEC meeting. Townsend expressed the goal for this new funding model is to help communities and OCED staff spend CDBG dollars more efficiently and to assist communities with executing more substantial projects.

Based on individual allocations, communities will now be designated to one of three tiers. Each tier is assigned a specific multiplier (e.g. 3x, 3.5x, or 5.5x), to determine a community's total lump sum allocation for the given Project Cycle. For a community's first time under the new funding model, communities are required to spend all "banked" funds in conjunction with their incoming allocation. Townsend noted communities will no longer have the option to "bank" CDBG funds. Project Cycles will run concurrently with the established fiscal year (e.g. July 1, 2026 – June 30, 2027).

Townsend stated she will begin to meet with Project Cycle 2026 communities in the coming weeks and for communities to be on the lookout for a meeting request. These meetings will focus on reviewing project applications and establishing clear project timelines.

D. 2026 Annual Action Plan Timeline Overview (Jasmyne Townsend, OCED)

Townsend gave a brief overview of the key dates for the 2026 Annual Action Plan. Townsend noted the approval and submission dates are subject to change based on when HUD announces the 2026-27 allocations. The latest possible date for Action Plan submission to HUD is August 15th.

- March 11, 2026: OCED shares RFP #8861 Affordable Housing funding recommendations
- March 27, 2026: Draft 2026 Action Plan available for review
- April – May 2026: 38-day public comment period/ Public hearings on Draft Plan
 - April 8, 2026 - Urban County Executive Committee
 - May 6, 2026 - Board of Commissioners
- May – June 2026 (subject to delay based on HUD timing): Approval of Final Plan by UCEC and BOC for Submission to HUD
 - May 13, 2026 - Urban County Executive Committee
 - May 20, 2026 - Board of Commissioners (First Read)
 - June 3, 2026 - Board of Commissioners (Final Approval)

Key milestones for the Affordable Housing RFP process are as follows:

- March 11, 2026: Staff to share RFP funding recommendations at UCEC meeting
- May – June 2026: RFP awards approved as part of the overall 2026 Action Plan

VI. Public Comment – Commissioner Scott opened for public comment at 2:45 pm. There were no comments received.

(Announcement) Cohen – We don't have another announcement section, but I wanted to mention here. We're a member of NAACED, NAACED is a membership organization that tracks all the legislative activity that goes on in DC. The 21st Century Road to Housing Act is going to go forward for a vote in the Senate, possibly tomorrow. We're not exactly sure what it will look like from there – possibly kicked back to the House of Representatives. The terms were not necessarily agreed on, but from my understanding what is being voted on at the Senate is a new act that includes some 21st nomenclator.

This will have some impact on us, I'm just unsure now what that impact will be. One thing that is a concern, which I think we will be exempt from, is that they were trying to tie housing production to future CDBG allocations – which doesn't make sense because CDBG has never been utilized or eligible to do new construction. However, I believe this will make it so that new construction would be an eligible activity under CDBG. We'll be keeping track of any new information that comes of this.

(Comment) Aniol – Thank you very much for addressing stuff that is happening at the Federal level. I would like to discuss some bills that were introduced at the State legislator– House Bill 55.22-55.32. From my understanding, this is the first 4 of 9 different bills that are eventually going to be introduced, I'm not sure what the remaining five are. I'm not comfortable with the language in these four bills. The limitation that has been put on the local governments in relation to providing input is disturbing to me. The other thing I want to mention, as it pertains to the ADUs, the duplexes by right, dwelling size, setback requirements, parking minimums – the City of Dexter already does everything that is required for communities to do. We've already done a thorough process of evaluating what works or could work within our community, so to have a blanket approach that everyone must follow goes against the core principles in the Planning Enabling Act where it specifically discusses master plans, reflecting policies and procedures, etc. based on the character composition of local communities. I'm still having trouble wrapping my mind around this bill. But I wanted to share to the committee so that people are aware.

AGENDA SUMMARY

Approval of 2026-27 Annual Action Plan (ACTION) (Jasmyne Townsend, OCED)

As a reminder, a 38-day public comment period was open from April 1st through May 8th to solicit input on the 2026 Draft Annual Action Plan. During the comment period, two (2) public hearings were scheduled; the public hearing scheduled to take place at the April UCEC meeting did not occur due to failure to meet quorum. It should also be noted that no members of the public were in attendance in-person or on Zoom throughout the duration of the published meeting time. The second and final public hearing is scheduled for May 6th at the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners' 7pm meeting, with options for in-person or virtual participation. A draft of the 2026 Annual Action was available on the Office of Community & Economic Development's website and social media platforms; updates to the draft were posted as needed. The Annual Action Plan identifies specific projects and programs the County intends to implement utilizing Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds during the period of July 1, 2026 – June 30, 2027.

The updated Draft 2026 Annual Action Plan for approval can be accessed [here](#). The 2026 Planned Activities table is available [here](#) and included in the meeting packet.

The remaining steps through to submission of the FY 2026-27 Action Plan are as follows:

- May 2026: Approval of Final Plan*
 - May 13, 2026 - Urban County Executive Committee Approval
 - May 20, 2026 - Board of Commissioners – First Read
 - June 3, 2026 - Board of Commissioners – Final Approval
 - June 5, 2026 - Final Action Plan submission to HUD

*Note: HUD announced its Fiscal Year 2026 Formula Grants on April 3, 2026. Based on this schedule, Washtenaw County would need to submit the final 2026 Annual Action Plan to HUD by June 2nd. Based on the constraints of the schedule above, staff will submit the final 2026 Annual Action Plan no later than June 5th. Staff have communicated with the Detroit CPD field office about this delay in submission of the plan. At the very latest, Annual Actions Plans are due to HUD no later than August 16th.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Allocation – 2026 Annual Action Plan

As reflected in the Summary of Planned Activities, HESG program funding to be awarded to homeless service providers will be \$197,592 with \$14,819 (7.5% cap) going towards ESG administration. As a reminder, ESG funds are awarded through the Continuum of Care's (CoC) Funding Review Team in the summer following Action Plan approval and submission. UCEC delegates the awarding of HUD ESG funds to the CoC.

Draft Motion: The Urban County Executive Committee approves the 2026 Annual Action Plan as presented – with the ability for staff to make final adjustments as needed – and recommends that the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners follow suit in adopting the Plan at their 7 PM meeting on June 3, 2026.

UCEC 2027 Meeting Calendar (Discussion) (Jasmyne Townsend, OCED)

To address quorum concerns, OCED staff is considering a morning meeting time for the UCEC 2027 meeting schedule. The meeting frequency will remain the same at 7 total meetings, as the schedule will continue to align with key Urban County deadlines and business items that require member discussion and input.

Staff would like to open the floor for discussion on whether an earlier meeting time would be better, and if the current meeting day (2nd Wednesdays) is still convenient for the majority of local units. Following this discussion, staff will send out a brief scheduling survey that takes into consideration the input received at this meeting. A final 2027 meeting schedule will be presented in June for the Committee's consideration and approval.
